FORMAL PUBLIC COMMENTS

May 10, 2016

Boulder Creek Library

1 MARK ROMKEE: As a I explained to the gentleman 2 over there, I have a number of concerns. One, the late 3 night bus, the 17 coming over the hill, and the last 35 4 that meet in Scotts Valley, there's a five-minute 5 difference in their schedules. And they're always good 6 about holding the 35, but that's one of the areas he's 7 looking to tie up to make the system a little smoother. 8 And I just wanted to emphasize the importance to 9 disabled persons of those late night buses.

That last bus, I would rather it take a little longer just to make sure that everybody can get home safely, because I went to school in Santa Clara, over the hill. So when a friend comes home to visit, we have pizza night and everybody gets together, you know, 35, 36 years later, which is neat.

And by being able to get on that last bus, I can put everyone from pizza to Milpitas, or Sunnyvale, and Cupertino and take the 17 bus over the hill and still get the 35 connection at the Cavallaro Center. That's the transit stop in Scotts Valley. And that way, the bus can hook up and I can get home safely.

And I just want to see them leave the early and late buses all intact as much as possible. Especially as a disabled person, the early bus is essential to my nutrition. Because if I have to go to Scotts Valley to 1 afford groceries and I get on a bus at 10 o'clock in the 2 morning, it's 70 degrees, my milk isn't going to get 3 home in good shape. So I have to get on the 5:30 bus 4 and get my groceries when it's 52 degrees outside. And 5 that's very important. So those early morning buses are 6 very important to people, the disabled folks like me, 7 who do our shopping. We need to get our perishable 8 groceries home and be able to afford them. 9 I'm concerned also at the proposal to stop

10 going up Glen Arbor Road. I understand the school buses 11 will still do that, so that's good. But there are 12 people up that road who would have a three-mile walk in 13 some cases to get to a bus stop now. And I think it's a 14 seven-minute -- something like seven minutes' 15 difference. And I hate to see anybody inconvenienced to 16 that kind of a walk, especially being disabled.

They've already cut back on the disabled paratransit and made the cost really not effective for most of those of us who are on a fixed income. And so it forces me to walk further and take fewer buses because there aren't as many buses.

So I am concerned about that.

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I am also -- had mentioned to him that the 17 inbound, when it goes along in Scotts Valley, there is no backtrack on I believe they call it 35A. And it goes 1 up to the school, but then it doesn't come back. Yet 2 the 17 comes down that way. And I have had drivers see 3 me and recognize me and stop and pick me up, even though 4 technically they're not supposed to. And that's 5 something they could consider, combining a part of that 6 route to help those of us. Because there's Palo Alto 7 Medical Foundation Center there with primary care 8 doctors. And you get one way up and then a mile and a half walk back without that bus. 9

10 So that would be a very helpful thing to 11 consider as far as melding routes together to help them 12 from that angle.

13 Otherwise, as far as the 35, which is my 14 primary bus, I can understand some late morning and mid 15 afternoon cuts. I would caution, though, once again, 16 for those of us who go to doctor's appointments 17 regularly -- I have to see a doctor every three months 18 for the rest of my life. And I schedule in the early 19 morning so I can get there. I'm always at least 20 to 20 40 minutes early. And because of the bus schedule -and if we have less buses and I have a 10 o'clock 21 22 appointment, I'm realistically probably going to have to 23 be at the doctor's office an hour to an hour and a half 24 early, and I may have to spend an extra hour and hour 25 and half to Ocean and Water. But I probably would have

to spend extra time at the corner of Ocean and Water trying to catch the 35 home as well, because they would cut out part of those buses.

4 So I am concerned, as a disabled person who is 5 Without the school buses during school, especially 54. 6 during the summer, when it gets hot, we don't need to be 7 sitting out in the sun. Disabled folks, those of us 8 going to doctors' appointments from taking the 35, we 9 don't need the extra time out in the sun. And there is 10 no covering on Ocean and Water for the 35 coming to 11 Boulder Creek.

12 A great deal of the bus stops here do not have 13 covering. The one in front of the bank right down here, 14 in front of Liberty Bank, does not have an awning. And 15 I know those are things that would cost even more. But 16 if you're going to cut buses down and have senior 17 citizens standing out or sitting out in the direct 18 It's creating a case for sun stroke and other sunlight. 19 things that those of us who are older can't fight off as 20 easily. So that is a concern to me.

I understand that some cuts need to be made, but as it is, a half hour to wait for a bus is one thing. It becomes a whole 'nother thing if you have to wait an hour and a half. Because if you get out of an appointment at 8:30 and the bus went by at 8:25 and now

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there's no bus until the 9:25, then the 9:25 gets you over there at 10:40 and you got to wait until 11:30 for a bus to go home instead of 11:00. And all of a sudden it's adding a half hour between the hospital and Ocean and Water, and then a half hour to wait each step along the way. And it really makes the trip almost unbearable.

8 So I would just ask them to carefully consider9 that.

10 The gentleman and I talked about them possibly 11 cutting out the 17 to Soquel park and ride. I think 12 that they should consider not only cutting it out but 13 selling that land and using it for better purposes. Ι 14 do question some of the spending cuts when it seems that 15 the disabled and the poorest people are the ones whose 16 routes are being cut. Like I said, that does concern 17 me.

I understand cuts like the Half Moon Bay bus,
which is a beautiful bus because it gives you a chance
to go up Highway 1. And for those of us who are
disabled and can't get out, that's a very nice perk.
And that's going to be going away. And I don't see any
way that that's going to stay.
And I really -- you know, I understand on the

one hand, but also understand that, you know, they broke

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1	ground on a new building for office space and some
2	things like that. The Cavallaro Center has not had a
3	tenant now in one year and a half since they had the
4	little bakery and coffee shop thing there. I think a
5	better effort could be made to get a tenant in there.
б	Starbucks. Why haven't they figured out something with
7	Starbucks? Starbucks is in a lot of BART areas.
8	There's a real nice coffee there at the Diridon Station
9	across from the Shark Tank. I think a real good effort
10	could be made to get a tenant in there to spending
11	money, putting money into the businesses' pocket.
12	And I think maybe they need to consider avenues
13	like that as far as revenue increasing, because, you
14	know, you've got a big empty building sitting there.
15	And to any tenant that's paying anything, it would be a
16	benefit.
17	So I think there are things like that that can
18	be considered as well.
19	And I appreciate the opportunity to give you my
20	input. I would just ask, think real hard about cutting
21	out the Glen Arbor folks. It's maybe seven minutes, but
22	I think it could be made up.
23	Please leave the late night bus as late as
24	possible, especially the one that comes all the way up
25	to Boulder Creek. Because for those of us a pizza

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night might not sound like a big deal, but when you're disabled, you don't get out maybe but once every couple of months. You really depend on something like that. And to not be able to go because I wouldn't be able to get a bus home would be a disappointment, to say the least.

And like I said, as a disabled person who
depends on the bus, I see it a lot differently than
other people, because it really is a lifeline for me.

10 So I have to look at it from the standpoint of 11 bringing groceries home, from the standpoint of getting 12 to my doctors' on time, and being able to do things in a 13 way that I'm not completely worn out from a simple trip.

14 So I covered Glen Arbor, the late night weekend 15 bus connecting with the 35, and a willingness, at least 16 on my part, to run a bus as late as they can at night. 17 Because even if it has to make a couple extra turns and 18 things, just to accommodate as many people. Because 19 that 17 over the hill, it makes a big difference if you 20 want to go and visit friends. And I just hate to see it 21 cut to the point that I couldn't connect and get home to Boulder Creek. 22

And I do appreciate that they hold that bus and the 5 minutes scheduling between 11:25 and 11:30, when the 17 shows up at the Cavallaro station, could be five

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1	of those minutes that they're looking to save at some
2	point.
3	This is the perspective of a cancer survivor,
4	who has to visit the doctor every three months. This is
5	the opinion of a cancer colon cancer patient who has
6	to see a doctor every three months and relies on transit
7	for fresh food, for doctor availability, and for the
8	necessities of life. So I do appreciate everything they
9	do and I do count on them a lot.
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1 HEATHER CLOWSER: I have thought of this many 2 times. Rather than cutting the services -- as it is 3 now, we have two buses an hour. Rather than cutting 4 services, how about just going to one bus an hour? And 5 rather than having them go up to the country club and 6 then another one to the Mountain Store, why don't have 7 one go to the country club, back to Highway 9, make a 8 left, and go to the Mountain Store. So it's just an idea that I had. 9

I don't rely on the bus totally because where I live, up by Big Basin, it doesn't run very often, and I can't depend on it. So I don't always use the bus, but I use it whenever I can, if it's convenient. It's not always convenient.

Like getting to the senior center for lunch, there isn't a bus that stops at the senior center at around noon, leaving from where I live, the country club. I don't think there's one that leaves from Boulder Creek that stops at the senior center at noon. Maybe if they had more -- I don't know.

I just think it would be sad for them to cut bus services, especially for the people that can't afford a car or disabled, that can't drive. There's all kinds of different reasons why people can't drive. Not everybody wants a car. 1 KIMBERLY BACH: I'm from Boulder Creek. I ride 2 the 35 and I'm very concerned about these cuts. There's 3 already a problem trying to meet the train, because I 4 have to take the 35 to catch the 17, and then catch 5 It's actually impossible to catch certain Amtrak. 6 Amtrak routes because you can't get to the train station 7 early enough. It's already impossible. So it's going 8 to be worse, especially with the discussion of cutting 9 the early morning route on the weekend.

At this point, I already have to leave in the dark in order to, let's say, go see my mom for Mother's Day. If they do this, I'll be in a position of having to stay in a motel or something overnight in order to catch the 17. Because I won't be able to get there early enough.

I'm also very disappointed that they will be cutting the bus to Big Basin after such a big deal was made out of that. I fear it's going to affect the finances of my community. We do make money from tourism, and there are tourists who were taking that bus to go hike and now they won't be able to.

I'm also concerned, especially if we cut late night trips, that we will have more drunk driving accidents. Anyone who's riding the 35 late -- let's say on a Thursday, because weekends up here start on 1 Thursdays because a lot of people up here work irregular 2 hours. So Thursday through Sunday, for example, late 3 night, you see a lot of inebriated people on the bus. 4 And if you cut those routes, those people will be 5 wandering in the roads or trying to drive, and that 6 concerns me a lot. I think people who are responsible 7 enough to try to take public transit when they're 8 hammered, should be encouraged.

I'm also concerned about discussion of making 9 10 cuts to the route during the afternoons on weekdays, 11 because the bus is already very impacted by the high school kids. As it is now, a lot of people in this 12 13 community avoid getting on the bus at certain times of 14 day because the bus will be flooded by kids over at the 15 high school. And they're talking about cutting 16 afternoon routes. We won't be able to avoid that, and 17 it's already standing room only.

18 Thank you for all your hard work, because I am
19 a big fan of METRO. I know you guys work really hard.
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1	NOREEN MCCUTCHEN: Hey, I've been riding the
2	bus for 41 years. What the deal is, I reside in
3	Watsonville, and I need to be able to get to Boulder
4	Creek as I take care of a friend who that has dementia.
5	I catch the bus on Freedom Boulevard, and cutting the
6	69A will be an epic disaster for me.
7	Also, reducing the 71 will make life rough.
8	I am fighting cancer, so getting to doctor's
9	appointments will be a hardship.
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1	CHARLES L. SH-VEEV: Just I would like to have
2	the possibility of combining the 35 country club and the
3	35 Mountain Store routes explored, have that possibility
4	explored to see whether it saves money and would enable
5	you to increase frequency. That is to say, over any
6	changes you are in other words, reduce cuts in
7	frequency for the 35 bus.
8	So that's actually all.
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1 I'm concerned -- my main PATRICIA WHITE: 2 concern, one of my main concerns is that the bus route 3 up Big Basin and the bus route past the Mountain Store 4 and the bus route on Bear Creek is being eliminated 5 completely, possibly. And there are people that will be 6 stranded, literally. That cannot get anywhere. And I 7 would like to see at least one bus in the morning and 8 one bus going back in the afternoon for those people. 9 And that concerns me. 10 And then this is a very rural area and people 11 have trouble getting -- if they don't live in town, they 12 have trouble getting the basic laundry, groceries done. 13 And I think it's important to -- and eliminate as little

14 as possible in this area. Because Santa Cruz has dual 15 buses or ways to get places. And they also have 16 availability of grocery stores and laundromats that you 17 can walk to.

18 And up here, a lot of people live in places19 where they can't walk to get the necessities.

And the 17 express is important.
That's my feeling.
And I understand it's necessary, but . . .

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1 CHRIS SCHIERMEYER: I represent the San Lorenzo 2 Valley Unified School District. And we had a few 3 concerns regarding the changes to the routes. One is 4 that the way the communication went out. We weren't 5 aware of the closure to the route going down Bear Creek 6 Road to Deerwood or the loss of the ST routes.

So San Lorenzo Valley Unified School District is a unique district in the mountains. We don't have safe routes to schools like other school districts with sidewalks. So students walking in high traffic areas such as Highway 9 or Bear Creek Road is a concern for getting to routes.

We understand the need for us to have a part in the cuts across the board, but we would like our routes to be considered due to safety of students getting to the appropriate bus stop to getting to the school routes.

We're also concerned about when the peak times are considered, so we'd hope that the county or METRO would work with the school district in determining the peak times for route 35, that it is around our start time of school and our end time of school.

And then -- so we really are concerned about the closure of the route to Deerwood and the walking of safe routes to school, and the impact it has on our

1	students of getting to school and home from school.
2	We look forward to working with the METRO on
3	how we can resolve those issues.
